He called Dr. Joel Engel, who was in charge of AT and T's cell phone program. After the two said hello, Mr. Cooper says he told Dr. Engel, "I'm calling you from a cell phone. A real cell phone. A personal, handheld, portable cell phone." Though that call was just the start of something huge, everything didn't change right away. It took Motorola over ten years to create a version that people could buy.

Any action resulting from such prejudice that seeks to exclude a person or a group of people from certain activities or due rewards is called discrimination. For instance, one of the most common and insidious prejudices in our country is the one against dark skin. The darker your skin colour, the more discrimination you have to face in your daily life. Both men and women are subjected to taunts, comments or malice based on the colour of their skin. Families and peer groups constantly ask you to do 'something' about your colour. All this because somehow we have been conditioned into believing that light skin is better than dark-a belief that has nothing to do with reason or reality.
